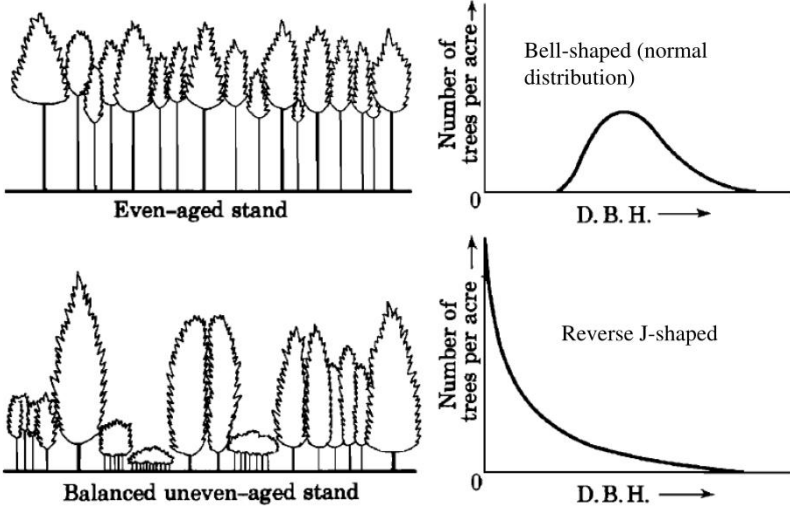

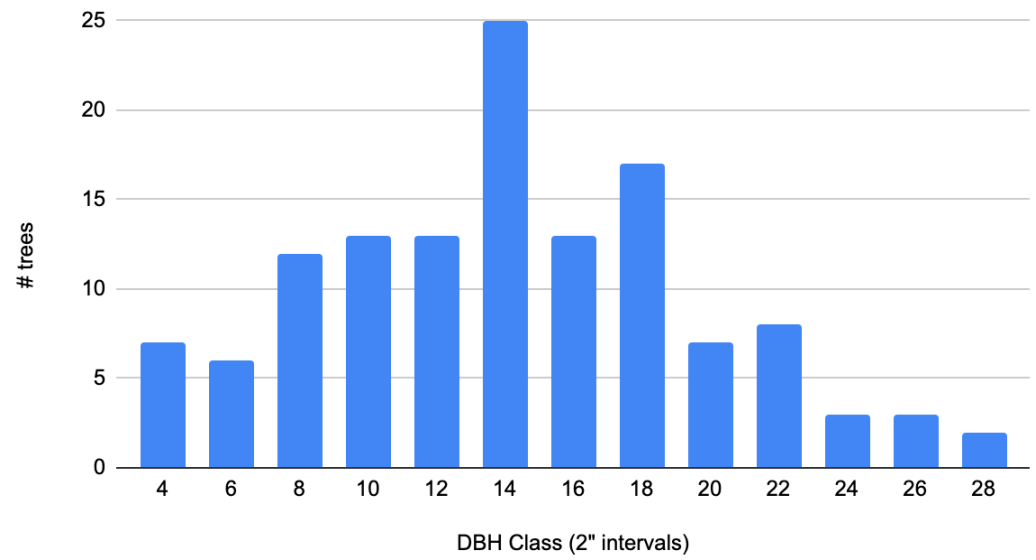


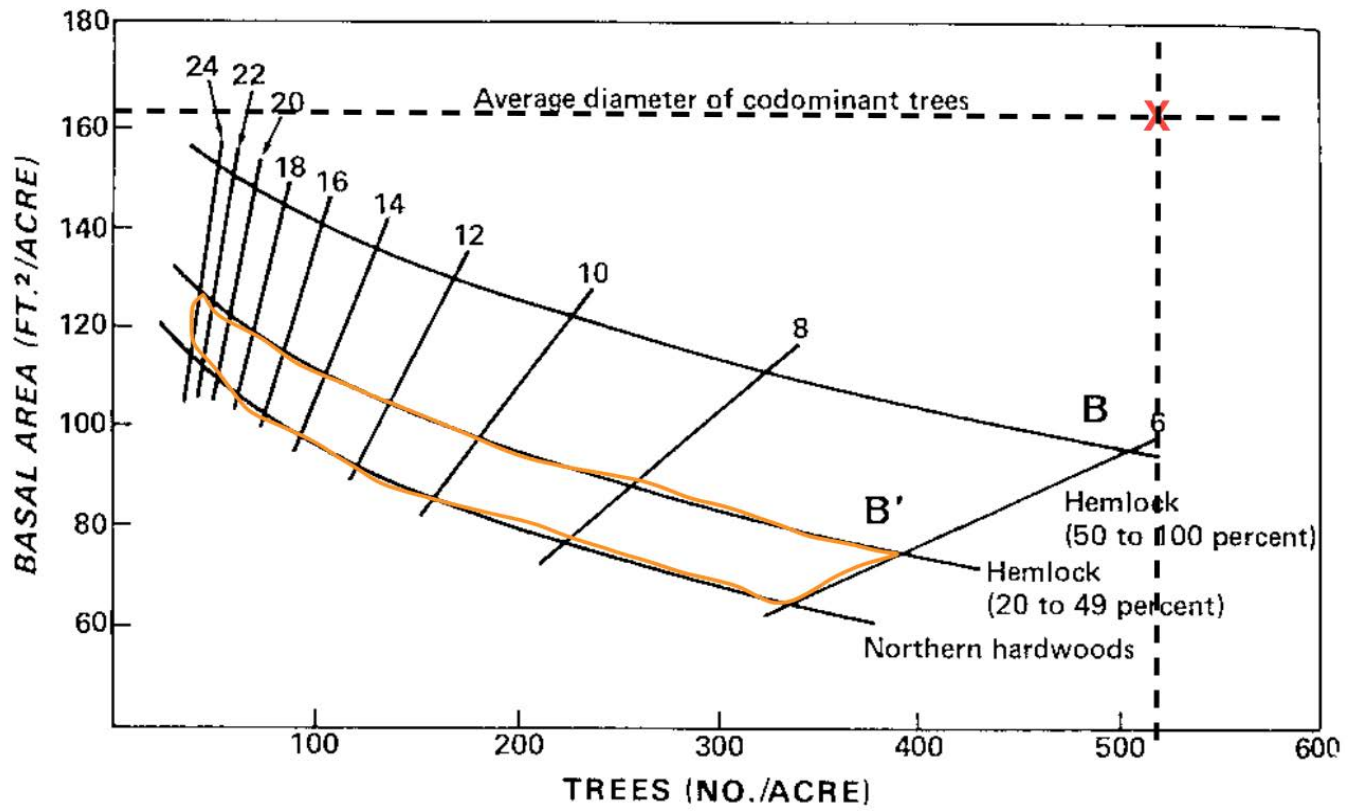
Bigtooth Aspen (*Populus grandidentata*)
